his week I have given a surprising amount of thought to a Youtube video I saw of a Japanese game show called Slippery Stairs. As far as I can make out (and I don't know any Japanese) it is a pretty simple idea, but an outrageously difficult challenge. Six or seven contestants in different coloured bodysuits have to climb to the top of a set of stairs made of ice, down which water is being poured constantly from two enormous taps. It looks almost impossible.

But hard as it is, they still take it on. Again and again they come, our plucky band of hapless Power Rangers, climbing and slipping and sliding. The video I watched was a 9-minute rollercoaster of emotion as time after time you thought one of them was about to get to the top, only for them to slip on the last step, or one of the others to grab them and pull them

back to the bottom. And throughout an audience cheers them on, places bets, and laughs at their misfortunes. It is very, very odd.

So what was it that attracted my attention – apart from the jumpsuits? Well actually it was the strange and brilliant way the video illustrated everything that the Christian faith isn't. Let me explain.

There's an idea about following Jesus that it is about climbing to the top of such a slippery set of steps. The odds are stacked against us from the beginning, and we will fall down over and over, with only the slightest chance of getting to the top. We will exhaust ourselves thinking that if we could only just outdo the people around us, only somehow get there first, we will win the prize. But chances are, we'll just fall down to the bottom again. And there will be people there to laugh themselves silly at our every mistake. God will be watching on, from the top, impassive, even absent.

As much, and as often as it might seem that way, it is not like that at all. Faith in Jesus isn't about getting everything right, and slipping back to the bottom if we get it wrong. It isn't about scrabbling to the top to get close to the prize. It isn't about competing with someone else, because maybe there isn't enough grace to go around. Instead, it's recognising someone who is not absent, but who comes to meet us in our sin and mess and brokenness; someone who will pick us up every time we fall, whose love and generosity are more than enough for anyone who ever asks for them. God is not impassive because the word itself is connected with not feeling suffering. But we know that God knows what suffering is like, because Jesus stumbled and fell for us, Jesus endured people's scorn and shame for us. Without Jesus, faith would ultimately be as difficult as this strangest of games, but we can hold on to the promise that with him, God makes all of this possible for people like you and me.

We Were Going To Have A Party!

e were going to have a party in October, you see we moved into our house No. 51 Norwich Road, Stoke Holy Cross, now called BEECH COTTAGE, in October 1970, so we have now been living in this lovely village for 50 years.

• We moved in with two little girls, Claire, who had just started school, and Julia. They were joined by Mark in 1972.

The cottage was known in the village as the Bottle Cottage because of the Victorian bottle ends in the flint stone walls. However in our deeds it was called Beech Cottage and so it has remained.

We found it mentioned on the village Tithe Map from the 1840s, and it was owned at the time by a Mr John Bond. He was listed in the White's Directory (the Yellow Pages of its day) variously as a brick layer and a brick maker. He also owned the much larger house next door now known as the Red House. His grave, and that of his daughter Sarah is in the churchyard under the big cedar tree and still clearly readable.

(Oddly enough, some of you will remember that the manager of Norwich City Football Club at the time of my research was also called John Bond.)

The flint stone in the construction more than likely came from the lime pit opposite. Working in a lime pit in Victorian times would have been a very hazardous occupation often ending up with lung disease and early death.

We have greatly valued being part of the village and our Christian family here. We have learned to "zoom", meeting each morning for $\frac{1}{2}$

hour of prayer. We can now meet in church on a Sunday morning suitably distanced and masked.

So we will have a party we just don't know when.

November is a month to remember

My grandmother, my grandfather, and my father in law The fallen from 2 World Wars.

Yet November is also a month of thanksgiving For Americans the world over But it can be for you too.

We can remember people family, friends, neighbours, with thanksgiving.

We can remember Jesus

with thanksgiving who said

Do this in remembrance of me.

Yes November is one of the times of the year I remember people who I no longer see – you might have particular times of the year too. My attitude is one of thanksgiving. I remember with thanks. My grandmother who encouraged me to sing songs I had sung at Sunday School and who patiently and attentively listened to me and who in the later years of her life in a care home I sang to and made her smile. My grandfather who was an example of hard work and who laboured in his beautiful garden. My father in law, who welcomed me into his family and without whose life I would not have had a husband.

When the church celebrates Holy Communion, the Eucharist, it gathers in thanksgiving and remembers Jesus' sacrifice of himself. In November let us remember with thanksgiving people but may we also remember Jesus. On the night he was betrayed, abandoned by his friends he had shared a meal with them (the Jews call that meal the Passover) and he encouraged them to continue remembering him when they shared the meal after his death.

COVID-19 has meant for many people they haven't been able to share meals with people they care about. Maybe there is a favourite meal you have shared with friends or family you cannot now be with in the same place. Why not make that meal this month and with thanksgiving eat it remembering them? And if you eat bread, remember these words Jesus said "I am the bread of life". He is the one who can sustain us in life, whatever happens to us. But if that's not your experience at the moment, maybe pray:

God, show me what does it mean that Jesus said I am the bread of life.
