Thinking about the prayer space got me wondering about the whole idea of making space to pray. Yes, it is a tricky thing in the busy life of a primary school, but what makes it difficult for you and me as well sometimes?

Well first of all, space is a place. At the school we are going to be transforming their fantastic outdoor classroom into our prayer space, but there is also the question of where we find it easiest to pray. Some people tell me that they like to pray while they are walking the dog. Others pop into the church. When I sat down with someone recently to reflect on my experience of prayer, and the struggles I sometimes have, her first question surprised me: "Where do you pray?" She reckoned that it was most important for me to have somewhere that I regularly sit. A place where you might not get disturbed. A place where you are not reminded, by looking round, of everything else that you ought to be doing. Where do you pray?

Second, time is space. There is always something else that we could all be doing. Just looking over at my Google tasks as I write this tells me that there are about 20 things I could be doing at the moment instead of praying, and nearly all of them are important. Will I ignore the lengthening list of jobs a little longer, and stop to pray? And when will I pray? I don't think it has to be the same time of day for everyone, but I am reminded that someone once advised me to "give God my best time." So because I am much more awake in the morning than I am in the evening, or especially in the afternoon, I try to give God time earlier in the day.

But there is something else about prayer space which is more important still, and is to do with what is going on inside our heads and our hearts. Because prayer is about allowing God space too. If I pray I am doing two important things. To begin with, I am recognising that I cannot manage everything myself, which is what the world is so very good at training us to do. Next, I am saying that when things happen that I cannot manage, which they do to all of us in the end, that I believe that God can do something about it, which is where faith comes in. Faith is a lot of things, but maybe it is partly allowing God the space to be Lord, and King, and make a difference in the world.

So how about making yourself a prayer space?


Stoke Holy Church gets a disabled friendly toilet

RANDOM FACTS ABOUT MAY

(taken from a variety of sources)

The month of May was possibly originally named after the Greek goddess of fertility, Maia. However, it was also suggested by the Roman poet Ovid that the name May comes from the Latin word 'maiores', which means 'elders'.

No month of the year either begins or ends on the same day as May.

May in the month of autumn in the northern hemisphere and spring in the southern hemisphere.

A maypole was built in 1543 or 1661 that was over 100 feet high. (Different sources, not surprisingly, give different dates).

In 1644, Members of Parliament banned all festivities on May Day.

The two flowers of May are considered to be the hawthorn and the lily of the valley.

There used to be a saying, 'Don't cast a clout till May is out'. 'Clout' is an old word for clothing. And it was never clear whether 'May' referred to the month of May or the hawthorn, which is also called may.

The Empire State Building in New York was officially opened on 1st May 1931.

To finish – some things not to believe about May:

• There was an old Cornish belief that it was unlucky to buy a broom in this month. It was considered equally unlucky to wash a blanket.

• Another thing which was believed by some people was that, if you washed your face on 1st May in the May dew, it would remove all freckles and pimples. Thus you would have a great complexion!

• A further strange belief that babies born in May would be sick throughout their childhood. (Where on earth did that come from?)

• Finally, it was believed by some that cats born in May would not catch rodents but brought home snakes instead.

Obviously we can't be certain of all the above dates, facts and beliefs. We just hope you found them entertaining.

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

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Adam's Gardening Tips for May

FERTILIZERS

Fertilizers fall into two groups, organic and inorganic. Organic fertiliser is from plant or animal material that has been composted for example from manure or vegetable matter. Inorganic fertiliser is from minerals or from large scale chemical processes. Purists like to rely wholly on the organic.

The major nutrients are nitrogen, phosphates and potash (potassium). Nitrogen fuels growth and encourages healthy chlorophylled leaves. A shortage of this can show itself in stunted growth or yellowish foliage. Care must be taken not to be tempted to overuse as this can lead to rampant weakened growth. Phosphorus is essential for promoting healthy roots and helps plants to establish well. Potash

enables the plant to make use of nitrogen and is associated with encouraging flowering and fruit maturity. The latter two tend to be held in the soil rather better than nitrogen which washes out (leaches) more readily. Other minor nutrients in the form of trace elements ie iron, magnesium, manganese and boron are also essential for plant health. Use a specialist guide to help with this.

Although the above are mostly applied to the soil another important way of getting nutrient into the plant is through foliar feeding. Seaweed extract for example can be sprayed directly onto the plant which will absorb the plant food through its leaves. This can be important after setbacks such as drought or some nutrient deficiency.

April has grown green manure crops for incorporation into the soil in the spring, for both the purpose of mopping up nitrogen which might leach out of the soil over the winter, and supplying nutrients to plants in the growing season as they break down in the soil. (It has the added bonus of keeping weeds at bay). Leguminous crops used in this way will enrich the soil with nitrogen which they fix from the air by root nodule action through a symbiotic relationship with bacteria.

Liquid manures are a very useful way of getting the nutrients to the plant roots especially in a dry time. Adam will be making

his liquid manure by hanging a small hessian sack of well-rotted farmyard manure in a large barrel of water and letting the nutrients infuse over a few weeks. A cupful of this liquid in a watering can will suffice. Comfrey leaves placed in a small mesh bag in a bucket of water for two weeks will also provide a nutritious liquid, which also needs to be diluted for use, but be careful. It smells!

ASPARAGUS SOUP

In May the asparagus is very good and UK grown. Buy it as fresh as you can and enjoy it steamed or in this very simple soup.

2 tbsp olive oil or butter 1 onion, finely chopped 400g asparagus, finely chopped and tips reserved 500ml hot chicken stock salt and freshly ground black pepper 4 tbsp double cream

Melt the butter or heat the oil and fry the asparagus tips briefly to soften. Remove from the pan and set aside. Add the chopped onion and soften gently, then add the asparagus and cook for a few minutes. Add the stock and simmer gently for about four minutes until the asparagus is tender.

Liquidise or blend the soup until it is smooth, season and add the cream. Serve with the tips scattered over the soup.
