In fact, the eighth piece of music was from a recording of an opera that she was in as well; she just didn't happen to be singing on that one.

Most of us wouldn't only choose songs like this, I hope. Perhaps we might choose someone else singing? What would our favourite songs say about us, and the things we find important?

A favourite song of mine begins

The sun comes up, there's a new day dawning It's time to sing your song again

One of the reasons I am particularly thinking of this song as I write is that we have just had a glorious, sunny week, and it feels like spring is on the way. Of course by the time you read this, we will be a year on from when we were in the vicelike grip of the Beast from the East, so I shouldn't be hasty. But the sun coming up prompts me to be thankful to God for the gift of every new day. Every day is worth singing about.

And every day is worth singing God's song about, too. There are days when we really

We are always called to sing God's song. I am so convinced about this, and I like this song so much, that I have attempted to learn it on the piano, which I can't really play at all. It doesn't sound all that great, and certainly not the equal of the Grammywinning original. Yes, it won a Grammy! It also doesn't match a world-famous opera singer. But when I do it, because I'm not brilliant, I am not delighting in the sound of my own voice. I am singing God's song.

A couple of years ago now, I was watching BBC News and they were talking about a student who was having one of these wide awake brain operations that you may have seen on the TV. In fact, I am sure I have met someone around the villages who has had one themselves. The medics needed to get the patient to sing to test what they were doing to his brain. And I watched, captivated, as his croaky voice broke into the chorus of this same song:

Bless the Lord, o my Soul, o my Soul, Worship His holy Name Sing like never before, o my Soul, I'll worship his holy Name

Whatever may pass, and whatever lies before us, we can always sing God's song.

Saying goodbye to our much loved Pat Howlett at Arminghall

Any friends and family gathered at St Mary's church in Arminghall to say goodbye at Pat's funeral on Tuesday 12th February. Her life has impacted so many people and she will be sadly missed. Lyn and Rob took the service together and Rob gave a talk based on Jesus' story of 'The Good Samaritan', as it was just

so appropriate for how Pat had lived her life, always being there for other people.

Pat's son Adrian also gave a lovely reflection on her life. Below is an edited version of what Adrian termed "My words for Mum":

Pat, my Mum, was born on 25th June 1942 the only child of Fred and Phyllis Rouse in the village of Aldeby, She spent most of her childhood in Kirstead where Nanny was in service as a cook in the big house and Grandad was the herdsman for the dairy herd; this probably explains that when most children had a puppy Mum had a bull for a pet which she often rode around the village. She had a fantastic childhood as a country girl and often got in trouble for having pockets full of pink harvest mice of riding her bike over grass snakes to get frogs to pop out of their mouths.

She went on to be head girl at Hobart High School and when she left there at 15 she got a job working at Taylors grocers on St Catherine's Plain. Whilst working there a certain Rosa Thompson spotted her and ran back to her brother and told him to "get over there and marry her she is a hard worker". Being 20 years her senior and with a flash car and plenty of money they married soon after. So began the darkest years for my mum and she was soon working in the family fish and chip shop.

The chip shop was the hub of the community and often had parties for all the local business owners. During that time, Mum had two children, my sister Tina and me. My Dad contracted Alzheimers in 1978 and mum was left to run the business, the home and the family a challenge that would daunt most people but Mum loved a challenge.

After selling the fish shop, Mum was approached by Sainsburys to run the fish counter at their new store on Brazen Gate. This was the easy life for Mum as she spent most of her time chatting!

Sadly in 1991 my Mum lost both her parents



she was happiest. Shortly afterwards my Dad also passed away she had stuck by him for 15 years she deserved a medal! Following the family

tradition of being a bit of a card sharp she joined the crib team at

the wheel of fortune where she was partnered to Jim, I believe his first words were 'What the hell are you wearing?' (colourful knitted tights were all the fashion I believe). A relationship blossomed and a few years later they were married here in Arminghall. These were to be the happiest years of my Mum's life.

After a long battle with illness we lost Tina in 1996 something I don't think mum ever came to terms with. Mum completed her 25 years of service with Sainsbury's and retired at the ripe old age of 72.

Luckily she had the church to look after so she stayed busy and everyone will miss her jams and pickles.

Adrian shared many more anecdotes of Pat's life and it is a shame we don't have space to print more.

Two of Pat's close church friends sent in this piece about her.

Pat moved into the village when she married Jim about 23 years ago, and immediately involved herself in village life, proving to be a good, caring little bundle of energy. Her soups and cakes have been sampled and appreciated by many and the bacon butties she cooked in the last two years at the Lent breakfasts will long be remembered. In 2005 she filled in all the forms and managed to obtain a lottery grant for the village to enjoy the festivities of Trafalgar Day celebrations hog roast, plate painting and lots of fun!!!

As well as her churchwarden duties she cleaned and looked after the church and made sure there were always flowers to feel more welcoming. She hosted all the church fund raising events with her tireless energy and organisational skills. She was a good friend and neighbour to all she met - always willing to give a helping hand! We miss her.

The Birkbecks, Stoke Hall and more...

n the September 2018 edition of Free for All we wrote an article on Stoke Hall, based on information written by Richard Watts and the late Michael Ranson. At that time we did not have enough space to add more of the history of the Birkbeck family, specifically in relation to Stoke Holy Cross. So here goes.

There is no doubt that the Birkbecks were a very prestigious family in Stoke Holy Cross in the 1900s. Henry Birkbeck (born in 1821) moved to Norfolk from Settle in Yorkshire and employed a well known architect to design and build Stoke Hall as his family home. In 1842 Henry inherited a partnership in the Gurney Birkbeck Bank and the Stoke Estate. This inheritance came from his maternal grandfather, Joseph Gurney.

As stated in the previous article, Henry married Mary Anne Hammond and, after their marriage, commissioned the building of Stoke Hall. Until this marriage, Henry Birkbeck was a Quaker but later he joined the evangelical wing of the Church of England. He gave many gifts to Stoke Church in the late 1800s and he undoubtedly helped with funds for the great restoration and also donated funds for a new organ.

Sadly Henry's first wife died in 1862 after the birth of their sixth child; Mary was only 34 years old. A few years later Etheldreda Brown folkes came to the Hall as a governess to Henry's six children. Henry Birkbeck was so attracted by her charms that he married her in 1871, when she was half his age.

As part of the Birkbeck family history, there is a memorial window dedicated to Margaret (daughter of Henry and Etheldreda), who died aged 32. This window is on the south side of the chancel in Stoke Church.

Henry Birkbeck died aged 74 and was buried at Stoke Holy Cross on 5 February 1895.

Even though Stoke Hall no longer exists, Stoke Holy Cross Church Hall is another memorial to the Birkbeck family. In 1905, Martin and Geoffrey Birkbeck enacted a Deed of Gift of land at the corner of Long Lane to the Vicar and Wardens (The Trustees) for a building to be erected thereon. The hall was duly built with a large proportion of the costs met by the Birkbecks. This building was to be used for 'rites and ceremonies of the Church of England' and for religious, social and charitable purposes as the Trustees might think fit.

In 1956 when the Charity Commission regularised the arrangement by vesting the property in the Diocesan Board of Finance and confirmed the Parochial Church Council as 'Managing Trustees'.



Adam's Gardening Tips for March

SEED STORAGE AND HANDLING

The principles of seed storage are very straightforward. Keep the seeds cool, dry and preferably in an airtight container. A fridge is ideal! These days many seeds come in foil containers inside the seed packet. If you find small desiccant silica gel packs in any packaging, you can use these to help keep your seeds dry. If the silica turns pink it has become moist and can be re-dried in a warm oven.

The storage life of seeds can vary considerably from species to species. Aubergine, celeriac and celery for example can last for 4 years or more, but others such as sweetcorn, peas, beans and spinach last for a couple of years whilst swedes and turnips only remain viable for about a year. Parsnip seed really needs to be used straight away as it does not over year very well. Having said this it is always worth running a small test, by putting a few seeds on damp paper and covering them with cling film and observing the germination rate. If about half or more grow give the rest a chance in the soil.

It is both economic and interesting to save one's own seed. Adam has a friend who grows runner beans every year from saved seed which was originally used by her grandfather. They are excellent croppers! The seeds must be fully mature and need to be naturally dried to avoid damaging future germination. To collect very small seeds cover the seed head with a paper bag and shake the seeds into it. This will avoid accidental loss. It must be remembered that whilst most varieties will come true from seed (ie will replicate itself) with anything that has been described as a hybrid the resulting plants can be very unpredictable. This is depicted as F1 on the seed packet.

Varieties have changed and improved over the years as a result of hybridisation but it must be remembered that old heritage varieties can still contribute some good qualities relevant to today, particularly flavour. They may not be as easy to grow and have some disadvantages such as poor disease resistance but are always fun and interesting to try.

It is possible to obtain pelleted seed, (enclosed in clay) which can help handling and precision planting. The pellet may contain nutrients and some fungicide to protect the seed. April has found that pelleted parsnips germinated and grew very easily.

Recipe

Cabbages, red, white and green, are very good at this time of year and although it may seem strange to eat a salad in March it can feel very invigorating.

¹/₄ of a red cabbage finely shredded
¹/₄ of a white cabbage finely shredded
1 large carrot, peeled and coarsely grated.
Half a red onion thinly sliced (optional)
100 grams natural Greek yoghurt
Two tbsp mayonnaise
Juice of half a lemon
(or 1 tbsp white wine vinegar)
Salt and pepper.

Cut out the stalk of the cabbage before shredding. Mix the vegetables together. Then combine the remaining ingredients and add to the cabbage mixture. Season to taste. You can add any fresh herbs you have available if you wish. Eg Parsley, chives.
