he other week, to help with some leadership training I'm doing, I went and met some friends in Cambridge. (If you haven't been to Cambridge, it is worth a visit. It is nearly as nice as Norwich, but not quite.) We went out into the city, and tried to get chatting to people about church, and faith. We weren't trying to persuade people to believe: we wanted to see what they thought.

Between the four of us (we did it in two pairs) we met all sorts of interesting people, who had all sorts of interesting thoughts. They ranged from someone who was very much a Christian, who told us all about the things his church was doing, and what his faith meant to him, to others who didn't really know very much about church and Christianity at all. Of course, there were also a few people who didn't really want to chat, and that was fine too.

We asked people what they thought about church. We were pleased to hear that lots of people, whether they were regular churchgoers or not, were able to be really positive about lots of things the church was doing in their area, especially providing activities or events for their families or children (although one person stopped going at Christmas because he didn't like the things the Vicar was saying to the children about Santa). Some of the same people also seemed to value some of the moral guidance that the church offered. They talked quite a lot about respecting the church, even if it wasn't for them.

When we got to talking about faith, and about Jesus, things were a little different. One person who sees a lot of suffering in her job explained that it was hard to know what to think about why that stuff happened. Someone else said he thought there was something out there, and nothing he had met seemed better than the Christian faith, but that some of what it teaches is hard to believe. Another lady said she believed in Jesus, but it seemed like she wasn't sure what to do with it.

We know that a lot of people pray, even if they wouldn't say they believe in God, and most of the people we talked to said they did at least sometimes. Only one person said she never did. The questions got deeper, as we asked people what they would say if they were asked what life was all about. People mostly seemed to want to do good, and to enjoy life, which was very encouraging and understandable.

In the end, we asked them what they thought church leaders like us could be doing to connect better with people. Lots of people thought we were doing a good job, but others struggled to understand the basics of what Christian faith meant, or thought we should modernise a bit (that was the Santa chap again).

All in all, we had a really interesting time, and it has helped me to think a little more about talking to people in the villages about this kind of thing, or at least wondering what you think. So in case you want to get chatting to me, or one of the other folks from our churches, here are those questions again:

What do you think of the Church? Do you go? How often?

What do you think of the Christian faith? What do you think of Jesus?

Do you pray? if yes, who are you praying to?

If you were asked (perhaps by a teenager) what is life all about, how would you respond?

When life has been hard on you, where have you turned for help?

How can we help you to connect more with Church and the Christian faith?



# Join us to welcome The Archbishop of Canterbury during his visit to Norwich

he Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Reverend Justin Welby is coming to the Diocese in November, just a few days away from the 100th anniversary of the ending of WW1 and this, combined with his passion for reconciliation, has contributed strongly to the shaping of his programme.



On Wednesday 7 November the Archbishop will will start his visit with a visit to St John's Roman Catholic Cathedral for an ecumenical act of worship at 12 noon. Everyone is welcome to attend the event. At 5.30pm the Archbishop will attend Evensong at Norwich Cathedral followed by an evening of exploration into the subject of reconciliation. In the context of the WW1 anniversary, the evening will highlight not only our world's need for peace today but also the fact that every single one of us is called to be a peacemaker. 'Blessed are the peacemakers', Jesus tells us. "Love your enemies". But what might this actually look like in your life and mine? We hope this event will offer lots of ideas. Everyone is warmly invited to all of it or as much as you can manage. It will begin at 5.30pm with Choral Evensong and end at 9.15pm after Compline by Candlelight. At 6.30pm, you will be able to spend time moving around some specially devised Stations of Reconciliation.

At 7.15pm, Bishop Graham will chair 'Reflections on Reconciliation' and we will listen to opening contributions from a richly diverse panel including Pastor Rolf Stahl from Koblenz, Norwich's German twin-town; Dr Marian Prinsley, President of the Norwich Hebrew Congregation; those who will speak about the need for reconciliation in a world peopled by homeless refugees and also in a divided Church. In response to these initial reflections, the Archbishop will make his own presentation before leading us into a time of gathered silence and prayer. There will then be more time for people to make their pilgrimage around the Stations of Reconciliation before Compline brings the evening to a close.

On Thursday 8 November there will be a unique opportunity to hear the Archbishop in conversation with BBC Look East's Andrew Sinclair about being a Christian disciple. Everyone is invited to come along to enjoy a light bite of fish and chips at Great Yarmouth Minster at 7.30pm. You may even be served your fish and chips by the Archbishop himself!

## Caistor Hall

his beautiful Georgian House, set in 30 acres of woodlands and gardens, is a Grade II listed country property dating from the early 19th. Century. Roger Watkins complied the following history of the Hall and the estate of which it formed part from the 11th century.

The Doomsday book of 1086 noted that a priest who served Caistor parish had the use of a parsonage with 11 acres of land which is analogous with the present site of Caistor Hall.King Edward the Confessor (1042-1066) had granted the church and the manor to the monks of Bury St. Edmunds but it seems at some point the property and the church were seized by the monks from Norwich Cathedral Priory and the Abbott of Bury had to obtain a writ from then King Steven to get Caistor restored to his Abbey. At the reformation Caistor passed to the crown until Queen Mary Tudor gave the manor and the patronage of the church to her godson.

In the 1720s a new parsonage was built on the site of what is now the north wing of the Hall. It is believed the vicar Horatio Dashwood rebuilt the parsonage between 1795 and 1797 in the time of King George III and this forms the main element of Caistor Hall today. The Hall was part of a large estate of 1300 acres by 1880s when the occupier Mr Harry Green became a noted breeder of prize cattle. It later passed the Rector of Tacolneston. His son became Rector of Caistor, inherited the estate and who, as an amateur archaeologist, is said to have played a significant role in the excavations of the Caistor St. Edmund Roman Town. It was on his death in 1944 that the estate was sold and by 1948 Caistor Hall had become hotel and country club

Please do this before the 11th, Armistice Day. As part of Caistor's remembrance of the fallen there will be in the church the "THERE BUT NOT THERE" Tommy, on display, so please call in and take a few moments to remember those who lives were lost serving their country. (The church is open everyday from 10.00am to 4pm.)

## REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY SERVICE. (11th Nov)

As in previous years the service will commence in the church at 10-45 am, we will process to the memorial for the laying of the wreath and the reading of names, including those form Stoke Holy Cross and Dunston, then to observe the 2 minutes silence at 11 o'clock. The service will then conclude back at the church. At 7.05pm on the 11th, churches all over the United Kingdom are invited to take part in the ringing of bell/bells, RINGING FOR PEACE. Caistor will be taking part in this very significant event to mark the end of the First World War.

# Adam's Gardening Tips for November

#### **PRUNING**

Pruning is potentially a daunting task, but if one has an understanding of the way a plant grows and an idea of what is expected from the plant, then the method becomes apparent. There are basic principles which apply to most pruning tasks. At its simplest and particularly in young plants the formation of a framework and basic shape is the aim. To avoid spreading any diseases it is always better to use good clean sharp tools. This will leave the cut ends of wood less prone to infections. Make cuts above a bud and slanting away from the bud to shed rain water.

Fruit trees are winter pruned except plums, cherries and pears which are better pruned in the summer (April to July) to avoid Silver Leaf disease which is a fungal infection. Fruit trees can be pruned into many styles; a free standing goblet shape probably being the most common with a fairly open centre, but they also be trained as fans, espaliers or cordons against a wall or on a frame.

The following advice is mainly for standard fruit trees. Firstly, in any situation remove dead and diseased wood. In winter of course, all branches look dead! You can tell if they are alive by scraping the bark with your fingernail. If it is green it is alive, but if it is dry and brown it is dead! Then look at overlapping and rubbing branches keeping the ones that will give the better overall shape. Larger pieces need to be cut off flush with the trunk.

Fruit buds need to be identified. They are rounder and plumper in appearance than the potential leaf buds which are more slender and pointed. Depending on the variety of tree fruit buds can be on the tip or the sides of the branches. The leading bud on a young branch sends back growth inhibiting hormone which keep following buds in a state of dormancy. Therefore pruning off the tip (apical) bud allows two or three of the dormant buds behind to develop and grow on building up a framework.

Shorten the previous year's growth by about one third to an outward facing bud so that the new growth does not crowd the centre of the tree, but leave young laterals (side

shoots) which will become your fruit bearing branches in the following year.

The worst that can happen with over pruning is a lack of fruit the following year but the tree should recover and under pruning will lead to a cluttered framework which will poorly fruit. Neither situation is disastrous and can be remedied in time

#### **RECIPE**

#### **APPLE CAKE**

This cake is easy to make and tastes delicious. Serve warm or cold with double cream.

- 2 dessert apples peeled, cored and cut into slim wedges
- 1 tbsp lemon juice
- 125g softened butter
- 140g caster sugar
- 3 beaten eggs
- 225g plain flour
- 2 level tsp baking powder
- pinch of salt
- 5 tbsp milk
- 1.5 tbsp demerara sugar
- 0.5 tsp ground cinnamon.
- 1. Preheat the oven to 170C/150C Fan/Gas 3. Butter and line a 23cm/9in round cake tin.
- 3. Butter and line a 23cm/7m round cake tin.
- 2. Coat the apple wedges in the lemon juice and set aside.
- 3. In a large bowl, beat together the butter and sugar, using an electric hand mixer, until pale and fluffy. Add the eggs and beat until smooth. Sift in the flour, baking powder and salt and mix well. Slowly add the milk, mixing well after each addition, until you have a smooth batter.
- 4. Transfer the batter to the cake tin. Arrange the apple slices, flat-side down, on the batter in a spiral pattern.
- 5. For the topping, mix together the demerara sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle over the batter.
- 6. Bake in the middle of the oven for 40–45 minutes, or until a skewer inserted in the centre of the cake comes out clean and the top is golden-brown. Leave to cool for 15 minutes in the tin. Run a knife around the edges of the cake and turn it out of the tin onto a wire rack.
