# Praying for real

s God there? Does he care about what's going on? Is he going to do anything? Why does he let people get away with those things?

These are questions that lots of us might ask from time to time. Some of us ask them very often. They are the sort of questions that can make us worry if it's ok to ask them. They are the sort of questions that people who have followed Jesus for a long time often ask, and really worry if it's ok to ask them.

For about 2500 years, people have been using the words of the Psalms as they talk to God, both together and on their own. They are the prayer book of the Bible. Given that Jesus knew them so well, and mentions so many of them in the gospels, we might even say that they are God's prayer book.

We spent a long period through the summer months this year reflecting on the Psalms in our churches, and we were reminded again of something that some of us knew already, but perhaps all of us found surprising again. We discovered that the sort of questions which I asked at the beginning, and which feel a little dangerous for our faith, are exactly the sort of questions that people ask in the Psalms over and over again. We discovered that while the writers of the Psalms often find in the course

of their praying that God is there, and does care, and is acting, and won't let people get away with it forever, that they are still allowed to ask those questions.

As I have thought about this a little more, I have realised that this shows us something important about what God is like. If I were God – always a dangerous way to start a sentence – I would probably not tolerate that sort of questioning. If you have made the world, if you have put up with all of people's failings and weaknesses and loved them just the same, and shown that most of all by giving up your son for them, your only son, then the least you can expect of people is a few less difficult questions. Isn't it?

But I am constantly grateful that God is not like me, and always allows time and space for questions of this kind, even if he might ultimately want us to see the ways in which he is working in our lives, and in the world. Most of all, he does not ever want us to feel that these questions get between us and our relationship with him. If Jesus, who knows his Father better than any of us ever will, can cry out to him on the cross, asking him why he has forsaken him, then I think we can ask questions of God too. I hope so, because I do all the time.



live in Stoke Holy Cross, I am passionate about wildlife and nature and have been asked if I would share something with you the readers of the Free for All. We are so lucky to live in South Norfolk as it's a wildlife haven for plants, fungi, invertebrates, mammals and birds.

Not only do we have the River Tas running alongside the meadows near Dunston, Caistor and Stoke Holy Cross churches, opposite Caistor Church, High Ash, farmed by Chris and Daniel Skinner, has over 100 acres of pollen and nectar mix planted to help attract bees, moths and butterflies.

Over the past few years I have combined my love of nature with my hobby of photography and have been photographing the local flora and fauna. Churchyards are wonderful places to see and find many plants often some which are rarities.

Stoke and Caistor Churchyards are home to Little Owls and Barn Owls. Although mainly nocturnal, Little Owls are often seen during the day. They are found in a range of habitats including farmland and woodland. They feed on insects, earthworms and other invertebrates and small vertebrates. I took a photograph of one with a small rat sitting on a gravestone in Stoke Church yard. They have also been called burrowing owls as they sometimes nest in old rabbit burrows. Males hold territories which they

defend against intruders. They look short and dumpy when sitting on a post. Once you spot them, there is no mistaking those big round yellow eyes.

Barn Owls are often spotted flying along the River Tas low over the meadows hunting for food, especially after a wet or windy night which hinders their hunting. With heart-shaped face, buff back and wings and pure white underparts, the Barn Owl is a distinctive and much-loved countryside bird. Because of their call sometimes they are called screeches. They are nocturnal birds but in the springtime if they have young both parents will be seen hunting daytime to feed their young.

Around Stoke Mill, the River Tas and Poringland Lakes, slightly further a field at Shotesham Ford, you may be lucky and spot a Kingfisher. If you see them for the first time, you will be surprised how small they are. A fast flash of electric blue shooting down the river with a peep sound as they go will help you to spot them before they fly past you. Scan the Reed Mace and reeds as they often sit on them to fish. Look carefully at the bill. If it is all black it is a male. If the bottom of the bill is red, it is a female. The easy way to remember this is the ladies wear lipstick!!

# Caistor Church Queen Anne Hatchment

anels like this should not be confused with funerary hatchments. Instead, the display of the royal arms, became a required part of church furnishings under Henry VIII. The aim was to proclaim to all and sundry that Henry, not Rome, held ultimate jurisdiction over each parish church. It was up to the Churchwardens to find the money to fulfil the royal will, there is the feeling that not everybody complied, unless firmly prodded by Henry's Church Commissioners.

Many of the original Henrician panels were then removed under Mary Tudor only to be renewed again under Elizabeth. Some were also removed during the Civil War yet some parishes chose to replace them with arms of the English and Welsh Commonwealth so as to make their Cromwellian loyalties explicit.

With the Restoration of the Monarchy, these panels became a legal requirement again, this is why there are many with Charles II's arms.

The arms of Queen Anne here at Caistor are quite unusual, as they may have been made to replace an earlier, decaying panel, perhaps one dating all the way back to the Reformation. Interestingly the one at Caistor was made in the year of Anne's death, August 1714. The project was already probably under way the previous year and although she was in ill health, her death was not widely anticipated at that point in time, even if there had been rumours of it late 1713.

It is worth noting that these coat of arms are that of Anne as Queen of Great Britain, a new title that followed from the Union of Crowns in 1707. This shows that the parishioners of Caistor were fully aware of current political developments and took pains to get a painter who would get the panel just right.

We are very grateful for the help from Margit Thofner in compiling this information and also the generous anonymous donation from a local family enabling the Hatchment to be restored in 2017.

Donations given at the "COME for COFFEE" mornings held at CAISTOR St EDMUND church during September came to £180.00. This has been sent to the Save the Children emergency appeal: Food Crisis in East Africa. We are told that more than 5.1 million children across all four countries are expected to need treatment for malnutrition this year. Thank you to everyone who came and supported the Come for Coffee in September.

We look forward to see you and many more people when Come for Coffee commences again next May.



## Adam's Topical Tips November

s we move into November there is still much which can be harvested from the vegetable garden. You may have a range of brassicas, including cabbage, sprouts and kale, although this may be better left until later in the season. Spinach trickles on and the season for parsnips and leeks is well upon us.

Even though it is November there is still plenty of time to plant broad beans to give the plants a head start over spring sown crops. Early in the month is still not too late for planting garlic.

Whilst most flower bulbs are happy being planted during October, Tulips are far better left for November planting. Never forget to plant any bulb to a depth at least twice its own height to prevent bulbs drying out too early after flowering, which will discourage them from building up reserves for next year.

The season for pruning starts now; Cane fruit, fruit bushes such as Gooseberries, Currants and Blueberries and top fruit such as Apples and Pears (but not Plums which are best pruned in summer). Other trees such as Acers, Cherries, Birches and Magnolias are best pruned from now on when the sap is down, otherwise they tend to bleed.

At this time of year April can be seen raking leaves to put into her wire mesh leaf mould container as opposed to putting them on her compost heap. This is because leaves break down in a different way, mainly by fungal activity. This is best left for at least a year. It's worth making some leaf mould so that in the spring it can be mixed with sand/soil/sieved garden compost to make a potting mixture.

Adam meanwhile, can be seen insulating his herbaceous perennials, with either their own foliage cut off and placed over the plants, for example Gunnera, or covering them with a layer of straw. He is also potting some of his growing herbs and bringing them in, on window sills, for some early winter growth. And whilst on the subject of frost protection, now is the time to bring tender container plants into a cold greenhouse or similar.

#### November's Recipe

Since November is the month of Guy Fawkes and you may have plenty of pumpkin either growing or left over from Halloween the recipe this month is Pumpkin Soup. Don't worry too much about the precise measurements for this soup. (April was highly commended for this soup when she was 18!)

1kg pumpkin3 medium potatoes3 tomatoes2 pints of stock (or water)15 grams butter75 mls creamSmall crispy croutons to serve

Peel and cut up the pumpkin and the potatoes. Quarter the tomatoes and remove the pips. Put these vegetables in a pan with the stock, add salt and pepper and cook until tender. This will depend on the size of your vegetable pieces but 20 minutes should be the maximum. When the vegetables are cooked cool a little and then liquidise (or sieve). Return to the pan; add the butter and the cream. Check the seasoning. The soup should be a creamy consistency and a rich golden colour. Serve with the crouton.


